How safe is skill mix in dentistry?

Ahead of next year's Association of Dental Implantology congress, Sue Boyton explains what delegates will gain from her session on skill mix

The subject of skill mix is not new within the dental environment.

For some time, questions have been asked about whether team members' capabilities can be better utilised in order to streamline daily workflows and deliver better care to more patients.

The events of 2020 once again brought these issues to the fore, as dental professionals across the country were redeployed to support various other essential services.

Many were able to transfer the skills and experience they had gained in dentistry to other medical, scientific or communication roles, demonstrating how valuable skill mix could be.

When it comes to permanent and longterm changes in protocols and attitudes, it is important that the new way of doing things is truly better than the traditional. In dentistry, we are very focused on evidencebased procedures, and rightly so.

So, can we learn from the transfer of skills due to the COVID-19 pandemic and apply those lessons to dentistry moving forward?

Team approach

In Sue's words

During the challenge of COVID-19, what has become really clear is that members of the dental team are resourceful, adaptable and able to develop and use their skills to the fullest.

Many in the profession are looking at skills developed for redeployment and asking whether the 'new normal' will bring further opportunities for the dental team

in a huge variety of ways, including virus testing, tracing, wound dressing, medical observations and monitoring, history taking, talking to relatives, and assisting patients with technology to enable them to talk to

members using their skills

The cornerstone of this rapid change has been training, demonstrating competencies and working in a team, with some existing skills being deployed within a different framework, and some new skills being developed.

This is important, as one of the frequent questions asked in implant dentistry is about whether we make the most of skill

As dental team members have demonstrated that they can safely carry out a variety of very different tasks, this is a very timely question, particularly in the context of the frequently mentioned 'new normal'.

What dental team members can do now is set out by the General Dental Council (GDC), who have recognised that redeployment has temporarily changed this, as have the indemnity organisations.

The key for the GDC is that dental team members have to be trained, competent and indemnified for the task they undertake.

Nothing has changed there, apart from the tasks themselves.

The 'Is skill mix safe?' session at the ADI Team Congress is our chance to explore the issues and identify opportunities to make the very best use of skill mix for the benefit of the dental team and our patients.

We don't want to miss opportunities, but we want to make sure that what we do is safe – not only for our patients, but also for us as dental professionals.
